

Minneapolis Snow Shoveling Information

Keeping our sidewalks free of ice and snow is the neighborly thing to do, and it's the law. For your own benefit and to help your neighbors, people pushing strollers or using wheelchairs, and the many people in Minneapolis who walk, please do your part.

When it snows, make sure to clear your sidewalks of snow and ice to keep them safe and avoid a possible fine from the City.

Minneapolis Ordinance requires that property owners **clear sidewalks after the end of a snowfall within 24 hours**. When you shovel snow and clear ice:

- Shovel the sidewalks on all sides of your property, the full width of the sidewalk down to the bare pavement.
- Remove all ice from sidewalks. After the sidewalk is cleared, sprinkling a little sand can help prevent slipping on frosty sidewalks.
- Pile snow into your yard and boulevard. **It's illegal to put snow into streets and alleys.**
- If you have a corner property, clear curb cuts at corners and crosswalks to the street gutter. You are not required to clear snow ridges or piles left by the plows beyond the gutter. City crews will make an effort to return to do this work as quickly as possible, but with some 20,000 corners to clear across the City, it may take a while.



ALERT: Phone Scam Using MPD Number

The Minneapolis Police Department has received reports from individuals who stated that they were called by someone who claimed to be with the IRS. The caller asked for personal identifying information. The caller ID showed the Fifth Precinct's desk number: 612-673-5705.

THIS IS A SCAM.

No police or government agency will ever call you unexpectedly and demand personal information over the phone.

Reports so far only state the Fifth Precinct's phone number showing on caller ID, but other precinct numbers may also appear. You can view a list of Minneapolis precinct numbers at www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us/police. *(Each precinct's phone number is the same except the last digit represents the precinct number. For example, First Precinct would be 612-673-5701.)*

What you can do:

- NEVER give personal information to anyone over the phone or online unless you have initiated the call/contact and know exactly to whom you are speaking.

Minneapolis Winter Parking

The snow is here...

Stay informed about snow emergencies and winter parking restrictions and avoid a parking ticket or worse – a costly visit to the impound lot. Here are four ways to stay up to date on snow emergencies and parking rules:

1. Call the 612-348-SNOW hotline.
2. Visit the City of Minneapolis website: www.minneapolismn.gov/snow which posts information on snow emergencies and has a street lookup feature that lets you submit an address or a neighborhood to see where you can park during a snow emergency. You can also sign up for phone alerts and email alerts.
3. Use the same link to get to the free **snow emergency app**, which offers current parking rules and a street lookup.

GAF Participates in MPCA Air Quality Pilot Program

– *From Minneapolis Pollution Control Agency (MPCA)*

The MPCA recently started a pilot project to improve the air quality in Minneapolis by working outside the regulatory box.

The project aims to develop collaboration among the local government, key air emission sources in the city, and the communities around those facilities. The intent is to better understand and quantify air pollution from sources in Minneapolis and integrate what we know about air quality and human health with tools available for protecting them.



The normal regulatory approach is to consider facilities and their emissions individually, one at a time. The pilot, however, will treat these facilities as a group, working with them and neighboring residents to identify ways to reduce emissions and make other changes to address community concerns. The following 12 facilities have voluntarily agreed to participate in this initiative. These facilities were selected based on levels of actual or potential emissions and community recommendation:

NRG Energy • **GAF** • Smith Foundry • Prospect Foundry • Covanta Hennepin Energy Resource Co. University of Minnesota • Hennepin Energy Recovery Center • Metro Transit's Heywood Garage • Bituminous Roadways Inc. • Nico Products • Greatbatch – Globe Tool Inc. • Owens Corning Roofing and Asphalt

The first step in the pilot is to make sure we have accurate information about emissions from these facilities so that we can best assess their contribution to Minneapolis's ambient air quality. This may include doing air monitoring at some facilities and in surrounding neighborhoods. We also want to facilitate and improve communication between government agencies, the facilities, and area residents. Once we better understand the facilities' contribution to the area's air quality, we will identify options for reducing emissions, including engaging technical assistance resources available from government agencies, the U of M, and others.
