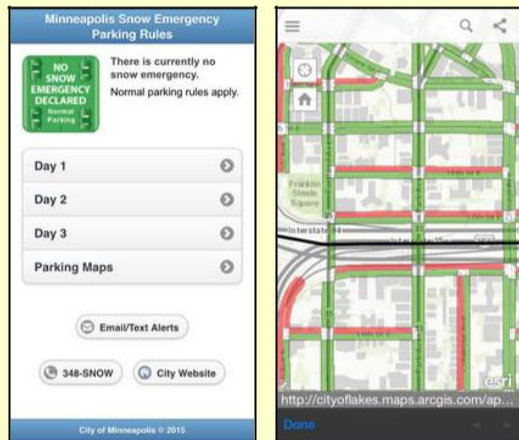

Snow Emergency App Available



Avoid the cost and hassle of a ticket and tow during a Snow Emergency.

The new and improved Minneapolis Snow Emergency app tells you if a Snow Emergency has been declared and puts all the parking rules right in the palm of your hand.

The app tells you where you can and can't park on Day 1, Day 2, and Day 3 of a Snow Emergency to help you avoid a ticket and a tow.

It also features a quick call button that connects you with the Minneapolis Snow Emergency Hotline, and buttons to sign up for email/text alerts.

Minneapolis Snow Shoveling Rules

Keeping our sidewalks free of ice and snow is the neighborly thing to do, and it's the law. For your own benefit and to help your neighbors, people pushing strollers or using wheelchairs, and the many people in Minneapolis who walk, please do your part.

Minneapolis Ordinance requires that property owners clear sidewalks after the end of a snowfall within:

- 24 hours for single family homes and duplexes
- Four daytime hours for apartments, commercial buildings, and all other properties (daytime hours begin at 8:00AM)
- Shovel the sidewalks on all sides of your property, the full width of the sidewalk down to the bare pavement.
- Remove all ice from sidewalks.
- Pile snow into your yard and boulevard. *It's against the law to shovel snow into streets and alleys.*



If you have a corner property, clear pedestrian ramps at the street corners and crosswalks to the street gutter. (You are not required to clear snow ridges or piles left by the plows beyond the gutter.) City crews will make an effort to return to do this work as quickly as possible, but it may take a while. However, your neighbors would appreciate it if you could clear the pile (or at least an opening) sooner to help shorten the wait and provide a clear passage. Avoid the cost of having the City clear your sidewalk

If the City of Minneapolis gets a complaint or discovers that a sidewalk is not properly cleared, Public Works will inspect the sidewalk and give the property owners a chance to clear it.

If the sidewalk has not been cleared upon re-inspection, the property owner may be issued a citation with a fine, and crews will remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk. Property owners will be billed for this service and unpaid bills will be added to property tax statements.

Remember:

- You are responsible for clearing ice on your sidewalk as well as snow. Ice can be more dangerous and intimidating than snow.
- The sooner and more completely you shovel, the less likely it is that the snow will become compacted ice which is much more difficult to remove.
- Arrange for someone to shovel anytime you are away.
- Shovel around your garbage carts and recycling bins. If you don't, the City will do it for you and charge a fee.

Canadian Pacific to Donate to Food Banks, Host Virtual Concert



Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, **Canadian Pacific (CP) will donate to food banks in communities along its network and host a virtual concert in lieu of its regular Holiday Train program.** The modified program will draw attention to food security issues, while ensuring donations go to all food banks that would ordinarily receive them, including those that typically host a Holiday Train event in alternating years.

“COVID-19 has created many challenges for communities across our network and has only increased the need at local food banks and food shelves,” said CP President and Chief Executive Officer Keith Creel. “It is our honor to continue to donate to communities across our network this year, even if the train itself will not run. The spirit of the Holiday Train program and the Christmas spirit will carry on this year through our virtual concert. We will have the Holiday Train rolling again spreading Christmas cheer as soon as it’s safe to do so!”

CP launched the Holiday Train in 1999, and every year since it has traveled across Canada and the northern U.S. raising money, collecting food and drawing attention to the important work of local food banks. In its first 21 years, the train has raised \$17.8 million and collected 4.8 million pounds of food for local food banks in communities along CP’s network.

Live music has always been part of the CP Holiday Train tradition. To maintain that tradition, CP will produce a benefit concert, with details to be announced when they’re available. CP intends to resume operating the annual train tour in 2021.

FREE COVID Tests & Flu Shots

The City of Minneapolis is offering free COVID-19 tests and flu shots. All are welcome. You do not need insurance for the test. The flu shots are covered by insurance.

If you have insurance, bring your insurance card for the flu shot. **If you don't have insurance, the flu shot is FREE.**

You can expect to get your test results in about two business days.

The COVID-19 test is FREE, and you do not need insurance for the test.

If you need medical care but don't have health insurance, the Minnesota Department of Health offers resources to find low-cost health care or health insurance.

development update: The Marshall Terrace Neighborhood Organization (MTNO) hosted a public meeting on September 28th to listen your comments and concerns about the proposed six-unit cluster development.

It was voted at this meeting by the residents in attendance that MTNO would submit an *Application of Appeal* to the Planning Commission of Minneapolis with our concerns of such a development.

At the Business, Inspections, Housing and Zoning Committee meeting held on October 20th, our Appeal was granted and new construction is now on hold. It was determined that the plan needs more review and that the developers should reach out to the neighborhood Organization to work together on design options that are both suitable for the property and the neighborhood.

MTNO will keep you posted on upcoming meetings on this development.
